By-Election

The Village of Glenwood will be holding a by-election on January 15th to fill the position vacated by Brian Kitchen. There are four candidates running in the by-election. They are Roger Clark, Courtney Loose, Sandy Lybbert and Lisa Welch. The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the village office. All village residents are eligible to vote.

If you are not able to vote on January 15th, you may go into the Village Office during business hours and pick up a "special ballot package." The packages must be returned sealed in their special envelope no later than 8:00 a.m. on January 15th. All ballots brought in after this time will not be considered valid. Please call ahead to the Village Office if you need a "special ballot package" so that Brad can have one ready for you when you come to pick it up.

All Candidates Forum

There will be an all candidates forum on Friday, January 12th at 7:00 p.m. in the Community Hall. Bring your questions that night or you may submit your questions to Sherri Tatlow at the Post Office. Questions will also be entertained from the floor. With four excellent choices for Village Council, this meeting will help you with your decision of which person would best fill the position. Come and hear the issues and where each candidate stands. This is also your chance to meet each of the candidates if you are new to the Village.

Prepay your Village Utilities

If you would like to save money on your water, sewer, and garbage charges this year (irrigation fees are not eligible for reduction) you may pre-pay at the Village Office. When you pre-pay your year's utility payments the Village of Glenwood will provide December's services free of charge. Pay 11 months and get 1 month free. This offer expires on March 31st. Contact Brad Salmon at the Village Office for more information.

Business Licenses and Building Permits

It is again time to renew your business licenses for the Village of Glenwood. All businesses in Glenwood, including home businesses, need to have a current business license. The licences are \$10.00 and can be obtained at the Village Office. You may also purchase an Alberta South West business license for \$40.00. This will give you a business license for all communities in Southern Alberta for one fee. Contact Brad at the Village Office for more information.

The Village would also like to remind all residents that if you are doing any exterior renovations or building other buildings on your property, you need to obtain a building permit. Permits are available at the Village Office for \$10.00 and up depending on the total cost of the renovations.

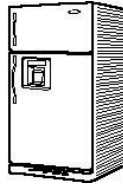

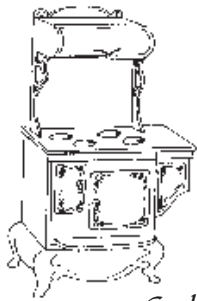

Crockpot Chicken N' Dumplings

4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut in small chunks
2 (10 ounce) cans condensed cream of chicken soup
1/4 cup onions, finely diced
1/2 cup baby carrots, cut into small chunks
2 cups water
2 (10 ounce) packages refrigerated biscuits
1 chicken bouillon cube

Combine all ingredients, except biscuits, in slow cooker. Cover and cook on low for 7 hours. 30 minutes before serving, tear biscuit dough into 1-inch pieces. Add to your slow cooker; stirring gently. Cover and cook on high for an additional 30 minutes or until biscuits are fluffed up and cooked through. 6 servings

Gak (Homemade Silly Putty)

1 cup white glue (Elmer's)
1 cup liquid starch
Food coloring

Put glue and coloring in plastic container. Add starch a little at a time, stirring constantly. Keep stirring until mixture holds together like putty. Test with your fingers, if too sticky, add more starch in small amounts until mass is smooth and rubbery.
