Jan 2009 Glenwood

Glenwood Council - Approved an interim loan from the ATB for up to \$130,000 for the new Mid Rivers Fire Truck. Total cost is about \$225,000 with Cardston County and Hill Spring funding the balance. The loan will be repaid using provincial grant money. The old fire truck will be repaired (once more) and kept as a backup. Our new machine is the latest generation of fire trucks with on-board foam and water. The platform was built by International and upgraded in Florida with all the new fire fighting features. In addition several new fire hydrants will be installed this summer. Check with your insurer, maybe you can get an insurance reduction.

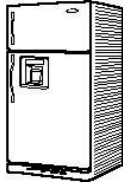

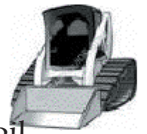
