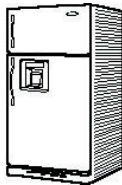

## **It's about time**

Press Release from the Government of Alberta

Clocks spring ahead three weeks earlier and fall back a week later as Alberta joins the U.S. and other Canadian provinces and territories in a move aimed at saving energy.

Starting this year, Daylight Saving Time in Alberta will be extended three weeks earlier in the spring and one week later in the fall. Albertans will now spring ahead on the second Sunday in March and fall back on the first Sunday in November. This change comes into effect for the first time on Sunday, March 11, 2007.

The main purpose of Daylight Saving Time (DST) is to make better use of daylight. In the spring, clocks are moved forward an hour, effectively moving an hour of daylight from the morning to the evening.

From 1987 to 2006, DST was from the first Sunday of April to the last Sunday in October. However, as part of a broad energy bill, the U.S. passed legislation last year extending the period of DST. To align our time with our major trading partner, and recognizing energy efficiency and other advantages to extending DST, Canadian provinces and territories have announced that the standard North American period for DST will replace their previous practice.

Alberta was the fourth province to decide to make the switch when in the 2006 session of the Alberta Legislature, the Daylight Saving Time Amendment Act was passed. Before making the decision to change, all ministries and relevant stake holders including the agriculture, education, energy, financial, industry, and transportation sectors were consulted. The consensus among the majority of stake holders was to synchronize with the U.S.

Energy savings were an important consideration taken into account. Individual households are expected to benefit from the extended hours of daylight as less electricity and natural gas and more natural light would be used during peak consumption hours.

Transport Canada advised that there will likely be a reduction in the number of pedestrian and motor vehicle occupant fatalities and injuries as the highest frequency of accidents occur between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m. The extra daylight during those hours makes pedestrians more visible to motorists. see <http://www.justice.gov.ab.ca/law/> for more information.

## **Prepay your Village Utilities**

If you would like to save money on your water, sewer, and garbage charges this year (irrigation fees are not eligible for reduction,) you may pre-pay at the Village Office. When you pre-pay your year's utility payments the Village of Glenwood will provide December's services free of charge. Pay 11 months and get 1 month free. This offer expires on March 31st.
